Welcome to the Preston North End Community and Education Trust strategy for 2020 to 2023, developed both internally and externally with the consideration of local, regional and national polices and with feedback from key stakeholders, including participants and staff, to shape our thinking.

We are the official charity of Preston North End Football Club. Our unique partnership distinguishes us from other charitable organisations, using PNE and football to connect, inspire and engage generations to achieve their goals. Last year alone, we engaged with over 11,000 people from Preston and the surrounding areas across 26 different programmes. We continue to value and understand the importance of reviewing and developing as we strive to be better.

Every year, we invest more of our funds into the community, leading to increased engagement and staff numbers, but most importantly, impacting the lives of the people living in the community of Preston.

We provide a wealth of opportunities for people to achieve their goals, in turn helping us to achieve our own. In recent years, we have witnessed the evolution of our community's needs and we have responded by diversifying our approach and delivery.

Our strategy will allow us to readdress the needs of our community and focuses on three key areas:

Community Engagement:

Delivering initiatives to create a safer, stronger and more resilient community.

Education:

To provide an education pathway for all to help people achieve their goals.

Health and Wellbeing:

Tackling the health inequalities across Preston by supporting people to lead healthier and more active lifestyles.

Our Current Provision



We currently deliver a range of projects across Preston and the surrounding areas, including:



PL Kicks

The PL Kicks programme, funded by the Premier League, uses the power of football and sport as a whole to provide free diversionary activities for eight to 18-year-olds across Preston.



NCS

The National Citizen Service programme is a government-backed initiative that gives 15 to 17-year-olds the opportunity to build their confidence and independence while developing life-skills on either a summer or autumn programme.



PNE Forces

The PNE Forces programme brings together past and present members of the military and their families for a weekly social hour and football session, as well as signposting them to local community services where required.



DIVERT

The DIVERT programme aims to reduce the reoffending rate in Lancashire among 18 to 25-year-olds by working with Custody Intervention Coaches in custody suites across the county.

Our Current Provision



Premier League Primary Stars

The Premier League Primary Stars programme combines maths and literacy concepts into children's PE lessons, with PNECET staff's involvement improving the quality of lessons and teachers' delivery.

Secondary School Provision

The Secondary School Provision Programme targets hard-to-reach Key Stage 4 students who may struggle with a lack of confidence or self-esteem in a conventional school environment.

Preston Centre of Sporting Excellence

A partnership between PNECET and Preston's College, the Preston Centre of Sporting Excellence provides high quality further education programmes in sport for 16 to 19-year-olds, from levels one to three.

USW Foundation Degree

In conjunction with the University of South Wales and the EFL Trust, PNECET offers a foundation degree course in Community Football Coaching and Development, which can be extended to a full degree qualification.





Our Current Provision







FIT FANS

Our FIT FANS programme takes men and women aged 35 to 65 on a health and fitness journey with educational classes and physical activity sessions once a week over a 12-week period at Deepdale.



Sporting Memories

Supporting over-50s living with dementia, depression or loneliness, the Sporting Memories programme brings people together over a common love for sport, reminiscing over past memories in both sport and otherwise.



Mental Health Programme

Our mental health programme supports young people suffering from the adverse effects of mental health by providing them with unique opportunities in the club's professional sporting environment.



Every Player Counts

The Every Player Counts programme aims to increase participation in football among disabled people with free sessions every week, for both children and adults in Preston.

Our Research



- Approximately 3.7 per cent of people in Preston are unemployed, in line with the national average.
- Ethnically diverse individuals form ten per cent of the local population, but have low participation in our activity programmes.
- Crime rates across Preston average at 133 per 1,000 persons, significantly above the national average of 110 per 1,000 persons.
- Preston is ranked in the top 40 percent worst post codes for crime, withpost codes near the stadium - PR1 and PR2 - being in the top 20 per cent for high crime rates.
- A Lancashire County Council study suggests that nine per cent of households in Preston are at risk of social isolation, the third highest in the county.



 33 per cent of children achieve a grade C (grade 5) or more in core academic subjects across Lancashire, which is lower than the national average of 37 per cent.

- 16 per cent of high schools in Preston and the surrounding areas are rated as 'requires improvement' from OFSTED.
- In Preston 57,657 households were recipients of free school meals with 17.9 per cent of children from low-income families.



Health and Wellbeing

- There are 10,848 estimated cases of people living with dementia in Lancashire with approximately nine per cent residing in Preston, a seven per cent increase from 2017/18. Research suggests 209,600 people in the UK will develop dementia this year.
- Mortality rates as a result of cardiovascular diseases in Preston are significantly higher than the national average, with 93.3 deaths per 100,000, against the national average of 71.7 deaths per 100,000.
- Ten per cent of Preston's population were seen by Mental Health services in 2018/19, 13 per cent of whom were under 18.
